Acts 2:1-11

1 When the day of Pentecost arrived, they were all together in one place. 2 And suddenly there came from heaven a sound like a mighty rushing wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. 3 And divided tongues as of fire appeared to them and rested on each one of them. 4 And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit gave them utterance.

5 Now there were dwelling in Jerusalem Jews, devout men from every nation under heaven. 6 And at this sound the multitude came together, and they were bewildered, because each one was hearing them speak in his own language. 7 And they were amazed and astonished, saying, "Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? 8 And how is it that we hear, each of us in his own native language? 9 Parthians and Medes and Elamites and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, 10 Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, 11 both Jews and proselytes, Cretans and Arabians—we hear them telling in our own tongues the mighty works of God."

4 Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; 5 and there are varieties of service, but the same Lord; 6 and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who empowers them all in everyone. 7 To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good. 8 For to one is given through the Spirit the utterance of wisdom, and to another the utterance of knowledge according to the same Spirit, 9 to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by the one Spirit, 10 to another the working of miracles, to another prophecy, to another the ability to distinguish between spirits, to another various kinds of tongues, to another the interpretation of tongues. 11 All these are empowered by one and the same Spirit, who apportions to each one individually as he wills.

12 For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. 13 For in one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and all were made to drink of one Spirit.

You are invited to Soaking Prayer via Zoom!

Soaking Prayer will be Tuesday, June 2, 2020 from 6:30 – 7:30 p.m. We will meet online using the Zoom app. The web browser client will download automatically when you start or join your first Zoom meeting; but, is also available free for manual download before the service/meeting here: <https://zoom.us/download>

+ Please indicate your interest in attending by an **RSVP to Mary Langeland at marylang704@gmail.com or call or text (352) 226-0209**. If you text, please indicate your name in the text.

+ After you RSVP, a Zoom invitation will be sent with the necessary access link prior to the Soaking Prayer service.

+ On the evening of June 2 at 6:30 p.m., click on the link in your invitation to join the service/meeting which will bring you to the narthex/main meeting room. There a host will greet you, answer any questions and admit you to one of the prayer/breakout rooms, each with two intercessors who will pray privately for you.

+ If you need to wait for an available prayer room, the host will admit you to the sanctuary/breakout room with worship music by Rick Guerry. You may soak in the sacred sounds as you wait or turn the sound down on your computer and meditate.

+ Once you have received prayer, you leave the prayer room to return to the narthex, either leaving the service, or the host can admit you to the sanctuary to listen to Rick's music.
