ORDINARY TIME

The time between special seasons is called Ordinary Time, which is the longest season of the year. Similarly, of our lives most ordinary! Yet the ordinary times of our lives are where most of our growth takes place. Green is used for this season to symbolize hope and growth (like a tree covered with green leaves). The normal, ordinary posture of Church is one expectant hope and growth. During this season, we study the hope and growth of Jesus's life and ministry on earth.

Welcome & Announcements

Processional

Please stand as you are able.

The cross, a symbol of Christ in our worship, leads us to the altar, reminding us that our way to God is through Jesus.

The Acclamation

Please remain standing as you are able.

With these words we affirm to one another and God why

we've come together to worship.

Celebrant Blessed be God: the Father, the

Son, and the Holy Spirit.

People And blessed be his kingdom, now

and for ever. Amen.

The Collect for Purity

Please remain standing as you are able.

A "collect" collects our prayers together in unity. This prayer acknowledges our need for help to worship God with all our heart, soul, and mind.

All

Almighty God, to you all hearts are open, all desires known, and from you no secrets are hid: Cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy Name; through Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Summary of the Law

Please remain standing as you are able.

Remembering the focus of our faith—to love God and others—gives us opportunity to reflect on what is most important.

Celebrant

Hear what our Lord Jesus Christ says:

You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the first and great commandment. And the second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself. On these two commandments depend all the Law and the Prophets.

Please remain standing as you are able.

As we reflect, we recognize and state our need for mercy because we routinely fail to love God and our neighbors.

Celebrant Lord, have mercy.

People Christ, have mercy.

The Gloria

Please remain standing as you are able.

In gratitude for God's mercy, we sing this ancient hymn of

praise which gives glory to God.

Glory to God in the highest, All and peace to his people on earth. Lord God, heavenly King, almighty God and Father, we worship you, we give you thanks, we praise you for your glory. Lord Jesus Christ, only Son of the Father, Lord God, Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world: have mercy on us; you are seated at the right hand of the Father: receive our prayer. For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

Children's Sermon

Please be seated.

Children are an important part of our church and worship.

Jesus said, "Let the children come to me; do not hinder them, for to such belongs the kingdom of God" (Mark 10:14). We bring the children forward so that they can know that God invites them to come and know Him.

Children in Kindergarten through 3rd grades are invited to attend Children's Church at this time. The children will return at the Peace. You may pick up your nursery-aged children for Holy Communion at that time.

The Collect of the Day

Please remain seated.

A "collect" collects our prayers together in unity. This prayer changes each week and focuses our prayers for the week ahead.

Celebrant The Lord be with you.

People And with your spirit.

Celebrant Let us pray.

The Celebrant prays.

People Amen.

The Lessons

Please remain seated for the first reading.

The Bible is one coherent story so we read from different parts, desiring to hear God speak to us through His Word.

The Lector gives a citation giving chapter and verse then reads the Scripture.

Lector The Word of the Lord.

People Thanks be to God.

Please stand as you are able for the Psalm.

The Psalm is typically read responsively by half-verse, led by the Celebrant with the People responding.

Celebrant Glory be to the Father, and to the

Son, and to the Holy Spirit,

People as it was in the beginning, is

now, and will be for ever. Amen.

Please be seated for the second reading.

The Lector gives a citation giving chapter and verse then reads the Scripture.

Lector The Word of the Lord.

People Thanks be to God.

We sing a chorus before and after the Gospel reading as we prepare our hearts for the sermon.

Please stand as you are able.

Deacon The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to St. _____.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

The Deacon or Priest appointed reads the Gospel.

Deacon The Gospel of the Lord.

People Praise to you, Lord Christ.

The Sermon

Please be seated.

The Nicene Creed

Please stand as you are able.

This is a sufficient statement of the Christian faith – what all Christians everywhere have always believed to be true. The term "Nicene" refers to its origins at the Council of Nicaea (a gathering of the whole Church) in 325 A.D. We say this each week as a reminder of what is most important to believe and what unites us as Christians.

Celebrant Let us confess our faith in the words of the Nicene Creed:

All We believe in one God,
the Father, the Almighty,
maker of heaven and earth,
of all that is, visible and invisible.
We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ,
the only-begotten Son of God,

eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made.

For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven,

was incarnate from the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary,

and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate;

he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures;

he ascended in to heaven

and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory ot judge the living and the dead,

and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life,

who proceeds from the Father and

the Son,

- who with the Father and the Son is worshiped and glorified,
- who has spoken through the prophets.
- We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.
- We acknowledge one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins.
- We look for the resurrection of the dead,
- and the life of the world to come.

 Amen.

The Prayers of the People

Please kneel as you are able.

We invite you to pray silently or aloud according to each of the prompts. If you pray aloud, please pray boldly and briefly so that others may hear and pray with you.

Reader Let us pray for the Church and for the world, saying, "hear our prayer." For the peace of the whole world, and for the well-being and unity of the people of God.

Reader For all those who are in trouble, sorrow, need, sickness, or any other adversity.

People Hear our prayer.

Reader For all those who have departed this life in the certain hope of the resurrection, in thanksgiving let us pray.

People Hear our prayer.

The Confession

Please remain kneeling as you are able.

Now that we are reminded of what is broken and painful in this life, we confess our sin (our rebellion against God), because it is the underlying cause of all that pains this world.

Deacon Let us humbly confess our sins to Almighty God.

Silence.

All Most merciful God,

we confess that we have sinned against you

in thought, word and deed,

by what we have done, and by what we have left undone.

We have not loved you with our whole heart;

we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves.

We are truly sorry and we humbly repent.

For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, have mercy on us and forgive us; that we may delight in your will, and walk in your ways, to the glory of your Name. Amen.

The Absolution

Having confessed our sin and our need for a Savior, the priest reminds us of God's incredible mercy and forgiveness, pronouncing God's absolution (forgiveness) of our sins.

Celebrant Almighty God, our heavenly Father, who in his great mercy has promised forgiveness of sins to all those who sincerely repent and with true faith turn to him, have mercy upon you, pardon and deliver you from all your sins, confirm and strengthen you in all goodness, and bring you to everlasting life; through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen*.

The Peace

Please stand as you are able.

Having received God's forgiveness, we express that we have been reconciled to God and one another by sharing the peace we now have through Jesus. We do this before the offering because Jesus says, "First be reconciled to your brother, and then come and offer your gift" (Matthew 5:24).

Celebrant The Peace of the Lord be always with you.

People And with your spirit.

The Ministers and People greet one another in the Name of the Lord. Parents may now pick up their children ages 4 and under from the nursery if they desire. Nursery is available through the end of the service. Children in Kindergarten through 3rd grades will return from Children's Church at this time.

The Offering and Doxology

In response to all that God has done for us, we worship God by giving of our finances and raising our voices together in song.

During the Offertory hymns or songs may be sung. The Deacon or Priest prepares the Holy Table for the celebration.

Please stand as you are able while the offerings are presented.

The Sursum Corda

Please remain standing as you are able.

Literally meaning "Lift up your hearts" the Sursum Corda begins a prayer of great thanksgiving to God for the redemption of the world through Jesus Christ.

Celebrant The Lord be with you.

People And with your spirit.

Celebrant Life up your hearts.

People We lift them up to the Lord.

Celebrant Let us give thanks to the Lord

our God.

People It is right to give him thanks and

praise.

Celebrant It is right, our duty and our joy,

always and everywhere to give

thanks to you, Father Almighty, Creator of heaven and earth.

Most Sundays

Through Jesus Christ our Lord, who on the first day of the week overcame death and the grave, and by his glorious resurrection opened to us the way of everlasting life.

All Saints' (November 5)

For in the multitude of your saints, you have surrounded us with so great a cloud of witnesses that we, rejoicing in their fellowship, may run with patience the race that is set before us, and, together with them, may receive the unfading crown of glory.

Christ the King (November 26)

Through your only begotten Son Jesus Christ, the King of kings and Lord of lords; for you have seated him at your right hand in glory, and put all things in

subjection under his feet, that he may present them to you, O Father, perfectly restored in beauty, truth, and love.

Therefore we praise you, joining with Angels and Archangels and with all the company of heaven, who for ever sing this hymn to proclaim the glory of your Name:

The Sanctus

Please remain standing as you are able.

Latin for "holy," this ancient hymn weaves together Scripture which describes the worship happening on heaven and earth (Isaiah 6:3, Psalm 118:26, Matthew 21:9, Revelation 4:8). We join with all the saints in heaven on earth in worshiping God.

All Holy, Holy, Holy, Lord God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory.
Hosanna in the highest.
Blessed is he who comes in the Name of the Lord.

The Prayer of Consecration

Please remain standing or kneel as you are able.

This prayer retells the story of redemption, recalling the wonderful mystery of God becoming human in the person of Jesus Christ to give His life for us and renew all things.

Celebrant

Holy and gracious Father: your infinite love you made us for yourself; and when we had sinned against you and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent your only Son Jesus Christ into the world for our salvation. By the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary he became flesh and dwelt among us. obedience to your will, he stretched out his arms upon the Cross and offered himself once for all, that by his suffering and death we might be saved. By his resurrection he broke the bonds of death, trampling Hell and Satan under his feet. As our great high priest, he ascended to your right hand in glory, that we come with confidence might

before the throne of grace.

On the night that he was betrayed, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Take, eat; this is my Body, which is given for you: Do this in remembrance of me."

Likewise, after supper, Jesus took the cup, and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, saying, "Drink this, all of you; for this is my Blood of the New Covenant, which is shed for you, and for many, for the forgiveness of sins: Whenever you drink it, do this in remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Christ has died.

Christ is risen.

Christ will come again.

We celebrate the memorial of our Celebrant redemption, O Father, in this

sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving, and we offer you these gifts. Sanctify them by your Word and Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son Jesus Christ. Sanctify us also, that we may worthily receive this Sacrament, and be made one body with him, that he may dwell in us and we in him. In the fullness of time, put all things in subjection under your Christ, and bring us with all your saints into the joy of your heavenly kingdom, where we shall see our Lord face to face.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. *Amen*.

The Lord's Prayer

Please remain standing or kneeling as you are able.

Jesus taught his disciples this prayer as a model for how to pray (Luke 11:1–4). The Lord's Prayer roughly breaks down into three types of prayers: Praise (Thank you), Petition (Please), and Penitence (Sorry). We pray this each week to remind us how Jesus taught us to pray.

Celebrant And now as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to pray:

All Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.

Give us this day our daily bread.

And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us.

And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

The Breaking of the Bread

As we hear the sound of the bread being broken, we remember the cost of Christ's sacrifice for us.

Celebrant Alleluia. Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us.

People Therefore let us keep the feast. Alleluia.

The Prayer of Humble Access

Though we have already confessed our sin and asked for and received God's absolution, together we summarize all that has been said.

All We do not presume to come to this your table, O merciful Lord, trusting in our own righteousness, but in your abundant and great mercies.

We are not worthy so much as to gather up the crumbs under your table; but you are the same Lord whose character is always to have mercy.

Grant us, therefore, gracious Lord, so to eat the flesh of your dear Son

Jesus Christ,
and to drink his blood,
that our sinful bodies may be made
clean by his body,
and our souls washed through his
most precious blood,
and that we may evermore dwell in
him, and he in us. Amen.

The Ministration of Communion

Please remain standing or kneeling as you are able.

In the Sacrament we partake of God's past, present, and future grace. The physical bread and wine nourish us with the spiritual presence of Jesus.

Celebrant

The gifts of God for the people of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

The Ministers receive the Sacrament and then give it to the People.

You may be seated.

During Communion, and in response to all we have heard, learned, and experienced during the service, we turn our hearts to sing praises to our God.

All baptized Christians are invited to come forward and

receive the bread and wine. It has long been the conviction of the Church that, if you receive only the bread or only the wine, you have received the sacrament in full. Therefore, if you have a personal need to refrain from either the bread or the wine this week, know that you are still fully communing with Christ and his Church.

Ushers will direct you to the altar rail. If you are not baptized and would like to receive a blessing, come forward and kneel, crossing your arms over your chest. The priest will quietly pray God's blessing upon you.

If you would like to receive prayer for anything in your life, members of the prayer team are available in the wings of the sanctuary under the exit signs.

The Post Communion Prayer

Please stand as you are able.

We give thanks for the feast we have partaken in and prepare to go back into the world to labor for his kingdom.

CelebrantLet us pray.

All Heavenly Father,
We thank you for feeding us with the spiritual food of the most precious Body and Blood of your Son our Savior Jesus Christ; and for assuring us in these holy mysteries

that we are living members of the

body of your Son,
and heirs of your eternal Kingdom.
And now, Father, send us out to do the
work you have
given us to do,
to love and serve you as faithful
witnesses of Christ our Lord.
To him, to you, and to the Holy Spirit,
be honor and glory, now and for
ever. Amen.

The Blessing

Please remain standing as you are able.

As we go out into the world, we receive God's blessing which empowers us to do the work before us.

The Bishop when present, or the Priest, gives this or an alternate blessing.

Celebrant

The peace of God, which passes all understanding, keep your hearts and minds in the knowledge and love of God, and of his Son Jesus Christ our Lord; and the blessing of God Almighty, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, be among

you, and remain with you always. Amen.

Recessional

We follow the cross out into the world, remembering that Jesus goes before us in all things.

The Dismissal

Please remain standing as you are able.

To honor our parish's origins in the Anglican Church of Kenya, we use the dismissal form from their Prayer Book.

Deacon All our problems:

People We send to the cross of Christ.

Deacon All our difficulties:

People We send to the cross of Christ.

Deacon All the devil's works:

People We send to the cross of Christ.

Deacon All our hopes:

People We set on the risen Christ.

Deacon Let us go forth into the world, rejoicing in the power of the Holy Spirit.

People Thanks be to God, who gives us the

victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.
